



# Pathways to Parents

**Supporting children in their journey to becoming a reader is one of the most important things parents can do. Once children become fluent, active readers they begin to make sense of the world around them, to ask and answer questions and to encounter worlds both real and imagined that are beyond their own experience.**

As the National Curriculum says, "Children need to read widely across both fiction and non-fiction to develop their knowledge of themselves and the world in which they live, to establish an appreciation and love of reading, and to gain knowledge across the curriculum. This also increases pupils' vocabulary because they encounter words they would rarely hear or use in everyday speech."

In the curriculum, reading is divided into two strands: Word Reading and Comprehension. The bridge between the two is referred to as Reading Fluency. Word Reading is perhaps the area most traditionally supported by parents, as children learn to phonetically decode the words on the page.

Fluency is just as important. By re-reading books, children learn to read more accurately, at an appropriate speed and with expression. This supports their comprehension because their effort goes into understanding what they read, rather than what the words say. As fluency grows, motivation increases. Children start to enjoy reading more and begin to do it without prompting.

Parents often stop reading with their children once fluency has been achieved. Pupils can read independently so parents' efforts are shifted elsewhere. However, having discussions with them about what they have read will do much to support a child's reading.

Comprehension can be broken down into various skills. These are practised within school during reading sessions but they can also form the basis of discussions at home in a more informal context:

- Clarifying vocabulary to explain what new words mean
- Retrieving key information from what has been read
- Summarising
- Inferring - reading between the lines
- Predicting what may happen next or what may have come before
- Unpicking why an author uses particular words and phrases
- Discussing the layout and organisation of a text
- Making comparisons between and within books

# NURSERY



Clarify vocabulary	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Which is the rhyming word? Which other words rhyme with this?</li><li>• What does _____ (new word) mean? e.g. 'enormous', 'roar', 'invitation'.</li></ul>
Retrieve	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Who/ what/ where/ which/ when...?</li><li>• What happened to ... at the end?</li><li>• What is your favourite part of the book? Explain why you like it.</li></ul>
Summarise	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Retell the main events – beginning, middle and end. Show your child how to do this and encourage them to remember much of what happens, prompting with questions if necessary.</li></ul>
Infer	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Who is your favourite character and why?</li><li>• "I wonder what happened to that character.....?"</li><li>• Help your child elaborate on their ideas: "That character looks sad. Do you think it is because...?"</li></ul>
Predict	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Look at the cover/ title/ blurb. Think about who/ what the characters, setting, events might be.</li><li>• Will this story have a happy ending?</li><li>• What might happen to the character in the end?</li></ul>
Structure and organisation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Find the front cover, title, back cover, blurb.</li><li>• What does the author do?</li><li>• Follow the text with your finger from left to right and top to bottom and encourage children to do the same.</li></ul>
Language choice	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Find the rhyme/ repeated phrase. Join in when it comes up.</li><li>• Spot words that start with the same initial sound.</li><li>• Count or clap syllables in a word.</li></ul>

# RECEPTION

Clarify vocabulary	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Are there any words you don't know the meaning of? Explain these to your child and use during other conversations.</li><li>• Which is the rhyming word? Which other words rhyme with this?</li></ul>
Retrieve	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Who/ what/ where/ which/ when...?</li><li>• What happened to... at the end?</li><li>• What is your favourite part of the book? Explain why you like it.</li></ul>
Summarise	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Retell the main events – What happened at the beginning, middle and end?</li><li>• Re-read stories multiple times to build fluency and understanding.</li></ul>
Infer	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• How do the characters think/ feel/ react about the events as you read each page?</li><li>• How can you tell that?</li><li>• Who is your favourite character and why?</li></ul>
Predict	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Look at the cover/ title/ blurb . What/ who might the characters, setting, events be in this story?</li><li>• Will this story have a happy ending? What makes you think that?</li></ul>
Structure and organisation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Find the labels, title, diagram, page, book cover, information on...</li><li>• Discuss whether a book is fiction or non-fiction.</li></ul>
Language choice	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Can you find the rhyme/ repeated phrase? Join in when it comes up.</li><li>• How might the line finish? Which word might the author choose?</li></ul>

Clarify vocabulary	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Which word tells you about the character/ setting?</li><li>• Can you think of another word for...? (or give examples of other words that mean the same.)</li></ul>
Retrieve	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Who/ what/ where/ which/ when...?</li><li>• What happened at the end?</li><li>• Can you list all three places the main character visited?</li><li>• What is your favourite part of the book? Why do you like it?</li></ul>
Summarise	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Can you retell the main events to another family member who has not read the book?</li><li>• List 3 things that happen to the character in the story.</li><li>• What is the information telling us?</li></ul>
Infer	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• How/ why did _____ feel/ react? How can you tell that?</li><li>• What does this tell us about how (character) is feeling?</li><li>• Who is your favourite character and why?</li></ul>

Discuss the reasons for thinking this.</li><li>• Is this story similar to any others you have read or films you have seen? Are any characters like people you have met?</li></ul>
Structure and organisation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Find the labels, title, subheadings, diagram, contents page, information on... How do these help us to read the text?</li><li>• Find three facts about...</li><li>• Support your child to use the index and glossary.</li></ul>

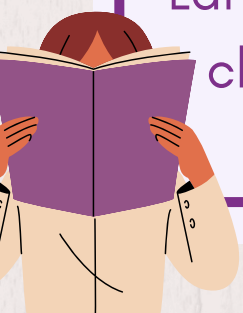

<p>Retrieve</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What is...? Why had...? Who else...? What event...? Why do...? Where?</li> <li>• Support your child to use the contents page/ index/ glossary to find information.</li> <li>• Talk about your favourite part of the book. Explain why you like it.</li> </ul>
<p>Summarise</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Retell the main events in the story to someone else in the family.</li> <li>• Which three words would you use to describe what the story is about/ about the character to someone else who hasn't read it?</li> </ul>

<p>Clarify vocabulary</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Find one word which tells you about a character/ setting/ mood.</li> <li>• What does... mean in this sentence?</li> <li>• Discuss other words which could replace one in the text.</li> <li>• During homework tasks, use a dictionary or thesaurus..</li> </ul>
<p>Retrieve</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Which two...? What is...? Why had...? Who else...? What event...? Where is?</li> <li>• Support your child to use the contents, index, glossary, sub-headings.</li> <li>• Discuss how the illustrations/diagrams/fact boxes/ sub-headings help us to find our way around the text.</li> <li>• Why is the word ___ in bold print / italics?</li> </ul>
<p>Summarise</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Retell the events in the story to someone else in the family who has not read the book.</li> <li>• Use five words to describe what the story/ paragraph/ chapter is about.</li> <li>• Can you choose three words to sum up the character/ setting?</li> </ul>
<p>Infer</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• How do you feel about (character)? Why?</li> <li>• How is the character feeling here? How do you know?</li> <li>• Discuss the dilemma the character faced in the story? What did they decide to do? Why? What would you do?</li> <li>• Who is the hero/villain/victim/champion in the story? How do you know?</li> </ul>
<p>Predict</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Use the cover/ blurb/ inside cover to think what might happen.</li> <li>• Is the character similar to any other characters / people you know?</li> <li>• Find details which tell us about the setting/atmosphere and discuss what might happen here? Have you been to/ read about a setting like this before? What is your impression of this place?</li> </ul>
<p>Structure and organisation</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ask your child to tell you about the features of different types of information writing – letters, diary writing, non-fiction.</li> <li>• Use the features to help you find information about...</li> <li>• Explain the theme of the paragraph or chapter.</li> </ul>
